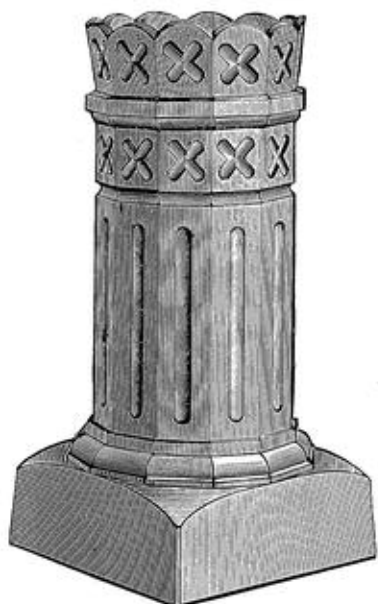
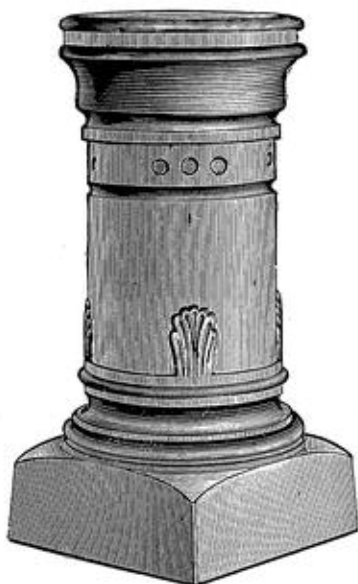

The facilities of the Terre Haute Coal and Lime Company embrace the possession of two extensive yards for storing and distributing purposes and three offices, and the trade which besides being largely local in character also extends throughout a considerable portion of this State

and Eastern Illinois. The company is the largest handler of coal at retail in this market and they practically handle all the anthracite coal that comes to Terre Haute. Their stock embraces anthracite, block, bituminous and blacksmithing coal, sewer pipe, lath, lime, hair, cement, fire-brick, chimney tops, tiling, etc., all of which are received direct from producers in large quantities and are offered to the trade at lowest prices. They are sole agents in this city for Delphi, Oakalla and the best grade Huntington Lime and their stock is equal to any demands that may be made upon it. Ten assistants and six teams are employed in the conduct of the business and all orders are filled with the greatest promptness.

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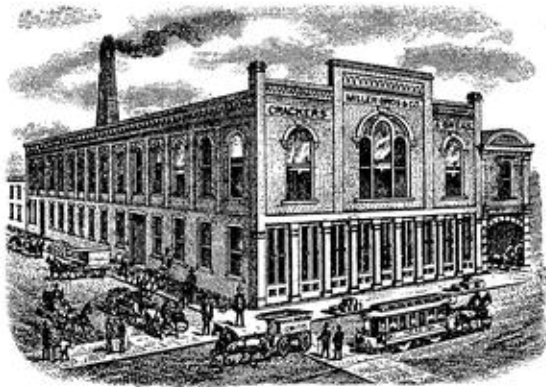

The wholesale manufacture of crackers, fancy biscuits and bread has of late years, by the introduction of improved mechanical aids, so revolutionized the industry that many bakeries now-a-days are only in name, being supplied daily with all their goods, of a quality superior and at less cost than would be possible for them to make the goods themselves.



The chief enterprise of this character in this section of the State is that of Messrs. Miller Bros. & Co., which was originally instituted by John Houck, in 1881, the present firm, composed of Christian F. and Henry G. Miller and Christian Hansing, having succeeded to the business in 1882. The firm's factory is comprised in a commodious building, 75 x 150 feet in dimensions, of which they occupy the entire ground floor for manufacturing purposes. It is equipped with a 30-horse power steam engine, a reel oven, and all the latest improved flour-sifting, mixing, kneading and cracker making machinery, having a capacity for converting about fifty barrels of flour daily into bread, crackers, cakes, and fancy biscuits of all kinds, employment being given to about twenty-five operatives, and three teams being required for delivering the product to the trade. All the products are made upon scientific principles, with chemical uniformity and care, of the best and purest materials, and are supplied at prices which result in a large and growing demand by consumers throughout the circuit of their trade. The goods are handsomely put up in attractive packages, and are distributed by the firm throughout a large part of Indiana and Illinois, and are also handled by all the wholesale grocery houses of the city. The enterprise is a valuable feature of the commercial resources of the city, and its prosperity and increasing trade is the natural result of the high quality of the products coupled with a business policy that has invariably been regulated by justice, liberality and integrity.
