

sending the open space, and halls and class rooms the other part. At the northwest and northeast corners of the building on both floors are large, well-lighted study rooms. Those on the northeast corner still serve in that capacity, but the others have been divided in half, the upper one containing the Senior session room and a mathematics recitation room, and the lower the commercial and botany departments.

In the front on the first floor are the office and the branch library. The latter is open to the public and the large collection of books



has been used constantly since it opened.

Upstairs over these rooms are the chemistry and physics laboratories. The chemistry laboratory is well equipped in every way and can comfortably accommodate 12 people and, if necessary, more than that. The physics room has not as yet all the equipment really necessary, but it is hoped that within a very short time it will have as complete an outfit as any of the other departments.

The rest of the first and second floors is taken up with class rooms.

The auditorium is a spacious place with a seating capacity of

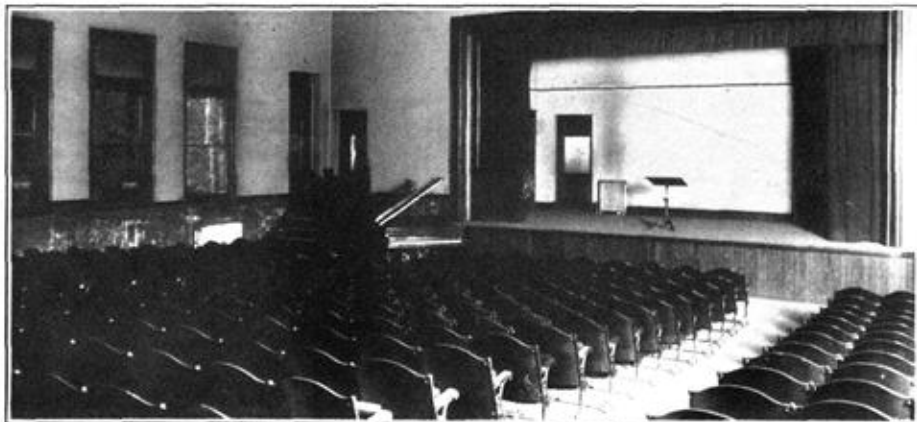

about 550. The stage is fairly large and the rooms back of it are arranged so as to serve conveniently for dressing rooms when theatricals are being given by the students. There have been mass meetings in the auditorium not less than two weeks apart and sometimes much oftener for the last year. These meetings do much to promote school spirit and create an interest in school activities aside from school work proper and they are quite popular with the students.



The student activities are manifold and there is an exceedingly small number of people in Garfield who have not an interest in at least one of the many organizations, such as the Orchestra, the Glee Club, the Tennis Club, the Public Speaking Society, etc. Thus every student feels that he is really a part of the school and has a personal responsibility in the well-being of the school. Combine this spirit with the stimulus afforded by the vocational courses offered by Garfield, and it is easy to see why the school has been so eminently successful thus far.
