COATES COLLEGE is a local Christian foundation for women, in the hands of the Presbyterian Church of the United States of America. It recognizes the intellectual capacity of women for an advanced course of study, and believes that the opportunities for such study should be brought as near the homes of each State as possible. It proposes on the lines of Christian discipline and example to conduct its students through a normal girlhood to the exalted plane of woman's loveliness and woman's power.

The founder of Coates College is Mrs. Jane P. Coates, of Greencastle, Indiana, whose fervent wish is that the College shall never divorce secular education from religious training, and who, in her letter of bestowal, said: "I desire that the Bible shall be the chief text book." The College, therefore, is distinctively Christian in its influence, discipline, and instruction. The systematic study of the Bible is pursued through all the courses.

THE SYNOD OF INDIANA, at its meeting at Richmond, Indiana, October, 1889, unanimously adopted the following resolutions, viz.:

Resolved, That the Synod of Indiana hereby expresses its confidence in the present administration of Coates College and cordially commends it as a worthy institution under the fostering care and direction of the Presbyterian Church.

Resolved, That we call the attention of our Presbyterian families to the wealth and thoroughness of the course of study, both as regards the intellectual and religious culture of young women, and to the fact that the aim of the College is to return its students to the churches from which they come especially qualified for Christian work.

Also at the Indianapolis meeting October 14, 1890, the following:

That we endorse the application of Coates College, at Terre Haute, for aid. That in view of the new provisions of the Board of Aid for Colleges, this Synod requests her churches to remit their contributions for the Board of Aid directly to the treasurer of Coates College if they have no other institution to which they desire it devoted.

Coates College is in Terre Haute, Indiana. This city and its immediate neighborhood enjoy a remarkable exemption from all influences injurious to health. It is moreover, unusually accessible, entered, as it is, by some nine or ten railroads.

The College buildings are at the foot of Sixth street, on what is known as "Strawberry Hill." The Grounds are large and beautiful. Filled with forest trees and abounding in wild flowers, no more charming place could have been selected for such an institution. Situated on a high plateau, furnished with an abundance of pure water, and removed from the smoke and dust of the city, it is, in the opinion of resident physicians, a peculiarly healthful location, and one that provides ample opportunity for recreation and exercise.
